CAPT. HADAWAY SEVERELY BURNED IN BOAT ACCIDENT

Is Now At Marine Hospital

Captain Howard Hadaway, well known boat owner and captain of Kent County, is in a serious condition at the Marine Hospital in Baltimore as the result of an accident aboard his power freight boat "Avalon."

Captain Hadaway went into the engine room to repair a leak in the exhaust pipe of the engine. He was later found lying across the hot exhaust pipe unconscious by Mr. Aubrey Fosset who was on the boat at the time. Captain Hadaway apparently became unconscious from the exhaust gas fumes and fell across the hot pipe severely burning his left side from his knee to his shoulder.

The boat was between Love Point and Queenstown when the accident occurred and he was taken to the Kent and Queen Annes Hospital and later to the Marine Hospital, Baltimore where it was found necessary to amputate his arm. Captain Hadaway has been sailing in upper bay waters for a long period of years.

ELECTRIFICATION WORK TO START HERE NEXT WEEK

160 Miles To Be Built Here

Construction work on 160 miles of rural electrification work will start in Kent County next week and the contract calls for the completion of the work within a period of three months.

The lines will extend to practically all parts of the county with the exception of a protested area east of the Fairlee-Tolchester road.

The work is being done under the auspices of the Federal Rural Electrification program.

Forgotten Fortnight

When the English adopted the Gregorian calendar in 1752 it was necessary to "make up" 11 days, and September 2 was changed to September 14. THIEVES RAID HUEY'S STORE AT MASSEY

Also Rob Railroad Station

Thieves, Sunday night, broke in and raided the hardware store of Mr. Frank Huey at Massey and then broke into the railroad station in that up-the-county town.

When discovered Monday morning, the combination of the safe had been knocked off with the use, apparently, of a large hammer, but the steel doors resisted any further attempt to get into the vault. This attempt to open the safe indicated that it was the work of amateurs unfamiliar with safe-cracking. Missing from the store was a \$60.00 electric drill which was later found on the railroad tracks near that town, \$3.00 was missing from a table cash drawer in the store. A large sledge hammer was found later in the yard of the store which authorities believe was used in breaking the safe combination.

That same night thieves broke into the railroad station at Massey and took two express packages which contained overalls. The thieves are working on the case but clues are scarce.

STAN. GOODMAN KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT FRIDAY

In Collision With White's Express Truck

Stanley Goodman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Goodman, of Quaker Neck, died at 11:30 A. M. at the Kent and Queen Annes Hospital as a result of an accident at 6 A. M. Friday morning in Quaker Neck on the nine foot concrete road near the Stoops home. The car he was driving was in collision with a truck of White's Express during the heavy fog. The truck, driven by Earl McLaughlin, careened off the road after the accident, went into a field and turned over. Mr. McLaughlin was not injured. The Goodman car, a complete wreck, remained on the road.

Mr. Goodman was rushed to the Kent and Queen Annes hospital in a serious condition and died five hours later.

Mr. Goodman, who was 24 years of age, is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ellen Marie Goodman, and two small daughters. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Goodman of Cliffs, and three sisters, Mrs. Helen Boone, Miss Naomi Goodman, and Miss Hilda Goodman, also survive.

Funeral services will be held at the home at Cliffs Monday afternoon at 2 P. M. to be conducted by Rev. William E. Lewis. Ralph H. Usilton funeral service is in charge of arrangements.
