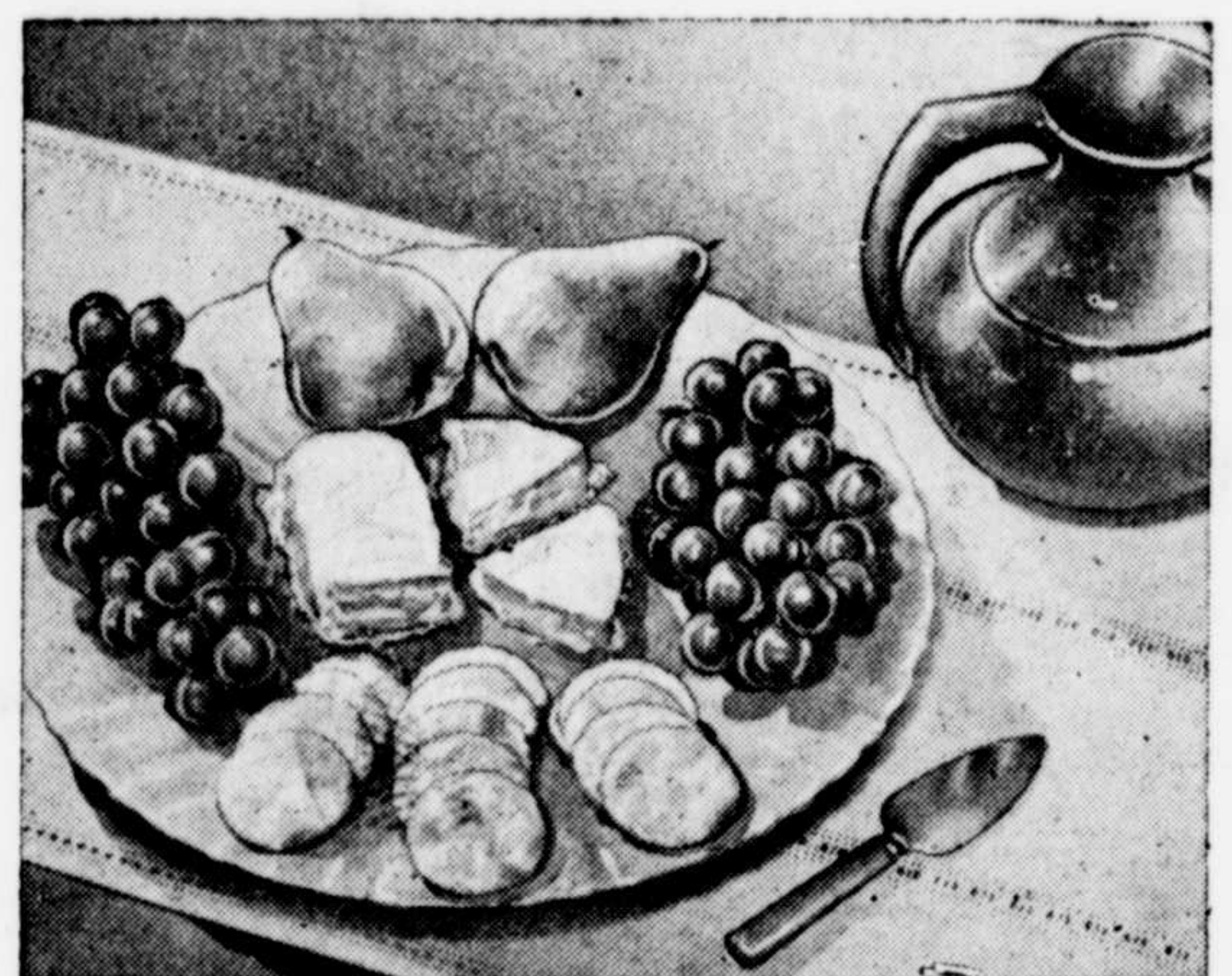

CHEESE AND CRACKERS for dessert is a charming continental custom that American hostesses will be able to copy this winter, in spite of war-time blockades. Such famous dessert cheeses as Camembert, tawny Liederkranz Brie and Limburger will be found at neighborhood groceries with "Made in America" labels and at economy prices.

American makers have perfected bacteriological control which makes possible more uniform quality than was ever produced in France where cheese makers relied on atmospheric conditions. Liederkranz, the high-flavored dessert cheese, is the only American-invented cheese to achieve a continental reputation. It was named after a New York singing society nearly half a century ago. Brie, the mildest of the dessert cheeses, and luscious Limburger have been made successfully in this country for several generations.

With these famous dessert cheeses available at low prices, even menu planners with strict economy budgets can afford to turn their families into cheese connoisseurs. A generous helping of Liederkranz cheese, for instance, costs only six cents.

Besides being the cheapest of distinctive desserts, these epicurean cheeses have all the essential food values of milk and are nonfattening. An ounce of Liederkranz cheese, for instance, has only 85 calories.

**LIEDERKRANZ CHEESE APPETIZER**  
Spread slices of rye or pumpernickel with butter and then with Liederkranz cheese. Cover with sliced marinated Bermuda onion. To marinate onion, add salt, pepper and equal quantities of oil and vinegar to sliced onion and let stand twenty minutes. Garnish with stuffed olives.

**LIEDERKRANZ AND WATERCRESS SPREAD**  
1 pkg. Liederkranz cheese 2 tablespoons finely minced watercress  
2 tablespoons beer

Mash Liederkranz cheese with a fork until soft and smooth. Add beer gradually and blend to a smooth paste. Fold in watercress. Keep in tightly covered jar in refrigerator. Use as a sandwich spread on rye bread or spread on crisp cracker as an appetizer. May also be used as a stuffing for celery.

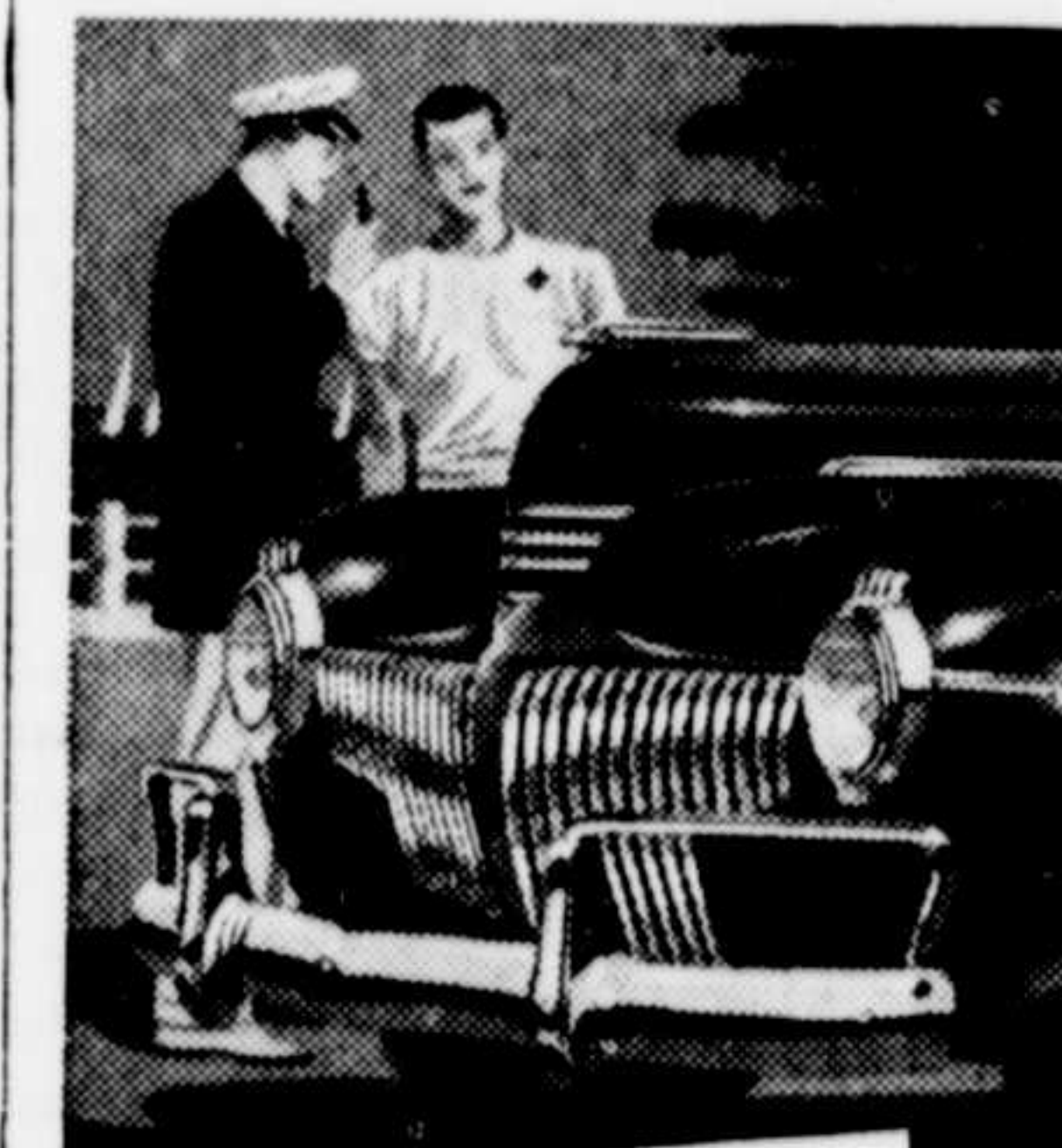
Her own development of generalities led her into many fields of investigation; her records have so much of value that they are worthy of their place in the Maryland Historical Society Archives.
