Reluctance Due to Cost

"My reluctance to call the Legislature together at this time has been occasioned entirely by the considera- BOYS' CLUB AT tion of the costs to the taxpayers. I had hoped for some definite statement of policy from Washington in connection with the extension of the time limit. The indefiniteness of information from the Capital has, however, made it dangerous to gamble on future congressional actions.

"I have asked, among others, the leaders of the General Assembly, both Democrats and Republicans, to meet with me, first, to advise with me concerning the need for such a special session; second, to co-ordinate all effort looking to the preparation of the necessary legislation, and, third, to enlist your efforts in persuading the membership of the General Assembly to remain in session only so long as is necessary to enact this legislation and this alone.

"There can be no excuse for considering anything else in a special session. All other matters can, and should, and, I hope, will be delayed until the regular session-a matter of a few days.

Submits Bill

"There will be laid before this conference a bill to carry into effect unemployment insurance in the State of Maryland drafted after months of research, hearing of all parties and groups interested.

"I am confident that, with the approval and earnest, active support of the gentlemen representing the General Assembly, only two or three days at the most would be required for CHEVY CHASE CLUB consideration and action by the Legislature.
