CONDUCTED BY HIGH SCHOOL
BOYS AND GIRLS

Gaithersburg Community Fair held in the Gaithersburg High School last week, was not only interesting and successful, but also reflected credit on the high school boys and girls who conducted the exhibition.

Walter Johnson, former Washington baseball hero, and now a farmer of Germantown carried off the honors in the display of Rhode Island Red Hens.

The fair sponsored by the Home Arts Department and Future Farmers of America Chapter of G. H. S., the board of directors which consists of Misses Lillian Murphy, Billie Beall, Ruth and Ethel Coleman.

About 100 people entered exhibits, such as afghans, quilts, canned goods, flowers, vegetables, farm, garden and field products, home-made cakes, pies, dogs, calves, pigs, ducks, turkeys, beautiful birds, including a peacock, rabbits, raccoons, high bred chickens, pigeons, cats, and home knit dresses. The hobby which was of much interest was a display on a felt background of an assortment of about 500 buttons collected from every country, each with a little history by Miss Virginia Neeley of Gaithersburg.

In the agricultural section of the fair there was an interesting and educational experiment shown by Maurice Ward. It consisted of two pigs. The first was three months old and weighed 58 pounds. This pig had been fed regularly on Bowman Bros., prepared

hog food. The second pig was nine months old, but weighed less than 24 pounds. He had been neglected and fed on scraps of unbalanced ration, irregularly.
