

Trucks must straddle center to clear their loads on this S-curve. Lower left, a typical Maryland main highway, showing narrow and winding right of way. Cars pushed out under such conditions cause head-on collisions, sideswipes and cars forced from roadway. This strip of highway is on U. S. Route 1. All are sections of the State's most important traffic arteries.

Constitution Praised by Judge Woodward

In a short talk to four residents of Montgomery County after he had admitted them to United States citizenship in the Circuit Court here, Judge Charles W. Woodward declared the Constitution of the United States to be "the greatest thing in this country today."

Those admitted to citizenship were Mrs. Marguerite B. M. Slattery of Kensington, a native of France; Mrs. Clara Hancock Boswell of Bethesda, native of Canada; Miss Margaret Hunter Elder of Chevy Chase, native of Scotland, and Mrs. Sarah Katherine Sholz of Gaithersburg, who was born in this country but who lost her citizenship when she married an alien.

In examining the applicants, Judge Woodward was assisted by Eugene E. Cole, naturalization examiner of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service.


