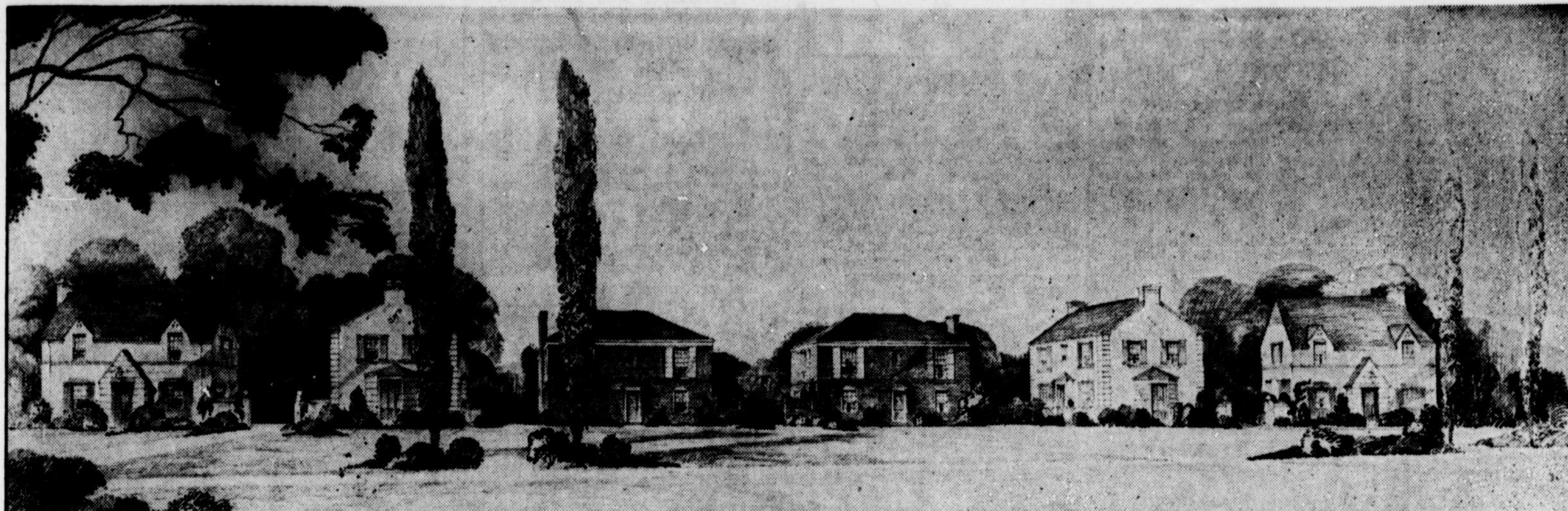


**Post Model Group Introduces Meadowbrook Village, Project of Kass Realty Co.**
