


### Massed Colors Lead the Legion Parade

Daniel J. Doherty, Boston attorney, who was elected national commander of the American Legion at its recent convention in New York city. Doherty was born in Woburn.







### Wild Ducks Shy Off From Lake Where Beavers Live

Jerseyville, Ill.—Wild ducks refused to frequent the waters of Groppe lake this season since the introduction of the beaver colony in the locality. Such is the observation of Fritz Groppe, who lives in the vicinity of the body of water being utilized as a beaver restoration project by the Illinois department of conservation.

"There were ducks about the lake last season," said Groppe, "but this year they have kept away, and I believe it is on account of the presence of the beavers."

### Russia Experimenting in River Pearl Culture

Murmansk, U. S. S. R.—An experimental farm for raising river pearls is being organized on the Kola peninsula to study the methods of artificial pearl formation. Last summer an expedition found

about 3,000,000 pearl oysters in the rivers of the Kola peninsula.

As is known, an irritation by an alien body causes the mollusk to emit mother-of-pearl, which coats this alien body, forming a pearl capsule around it. With this in mind, the expedition conducted interesting experiments. Several hundred pearl oysters were caught and their shells opened. A small shot was introduced into the body of each mollusk, which was then thrown into the river.

Captain Don Heap, one of the most talented halfbacks in the Middle West, is the big threat in North-




western university's backfield this fall. In addition to running and passing he calls signals. He weighs 172 pounds.

### Wild Boar Hunting Open to California Nimrods

Monterey, Calif.—Wild boar hunting, one of the aristocratic sports of Europe, has been opened to Californians by the construction of a new coastal highway along the 400,000-acre national park below the Monterey peninsula.

The wild boars were introduced some twenty years ago from Russia by a wealthy rancher. Despite the fact that his ranch embraced 25,000

acres, the boars multiplied so rapidly that they soon spread through the entire adjoining national park and as far south as 40 miles from their place of origin. Owing to the inaccessibility of the region, so far they have been generally free from the menace of hunters. The construction of the new highway, however, makes it easy for hunters to go after them, as well as wild pigs which flourish in the region, and deer.

While the latter are governed by an "open season," the boars and the wild pigs will have to take their chances at any season.

Single Plan for French Town Richelieu, France, is believed to be the only town in the world that was entirely built according to a single plan and never altered thereafter, says Collier's Weekly. Its walls, streets, public squares, palaces, houses, church, hotel and market place are the same as they were when completed in 1631.
