ed in the late glorious battles. Brig. Gen. Scott, who, has performed a prominent part, since the landing of the army in Canada, to the moment of his last wound at the battle of the 25th July, has received the brevet rank of major general.

Majors Jessup of the 25th-Leavenworth of the 9th and M'Neil of the 11th, who formed their regiments, composing Gen. Scott's brigade, under an impetuous fire of the enemy's artillery, in accurate lines, according to the superior discipline taught them by their leader—and whose gallant examples preserved them in this order till the completion of the victory of the 5th July, over a superior force of British regulars—have been brevetted Lt. Colonels.

Capt.
