FEDERAL OFFICERS RAID HAR-FORD COUNTY STILLS

Federal officers last week made raids on five illegal stills in Harford county. Four of the plants were dynamited and the fifth, a small one, broken up with axes.

Only one arrest was made, Johnnie Armes being seen at one of the plants, and he was later taken into custody. His trial will be before a U. S. Commissioner in Baltimore.
