DELAWARE PEACH CROP UN-HARMED

Unless some adverse weather conditions arrive between now and the rate spring months, prospects in Delaware are very good for a crop of peaches this year, according to information received at the office of Wilmer T. Derrickson, Director of the Bureau of Markets.

Few peaches were grown in Delaware during the past two years because of adverse weather conditions during the winter months which kill-Hockessin and Cedars, Del.-W. H. ed the fruit before blossom time.

A number of peach orchards have been watched closely for several months and thus far no signs have been found that would indicate any damage to the crop for this year, except some slight damage to the Haie *Newark-Union, Del.-V. E. Hills variety but at the present time this is not serious.

The Delaware peach crop will not be as large this year as in some former years because some of the growers took out their trees during the past two years when there was
