FOUR YEARS AGO AND NOW

"This time four years ago the wets in both parties were solemnly promising that if liquor were permitted to return it would be kept in rigidly formal clothes, and certainly it would be kept out of politics." So says a correspondent of the Washington Evening Star, in speaking of the National Conventions of 1932 and 1936.

The artistic convention books of both parties, reveals this correspondent, are to give conspicuous space to advertisements of leading liquor firms in the country. The solemn meetings at which are to be chosen the two candidates for national leadership for the next four years at this, a most critical point in people's affairs, are to be financed largely by vigorous effort to promote the sale of intoxicants, to increase the number of drinking citizens.

Some of the advertisers in the Democratic book, to be sold at \$2.50 per copy, are Schenley Products, at \$7,500; Frankfort Distillers, \$7,500; Calvert Distillers, \$2,500; Seagram Distillers, \$2,500; Anheuser Busch \$6,000, and Schiltz Brewing Company, of \$2,500. "If the amounts paid for space are correctly reported, it would seem that liquor ads are to have the inside covers of both front and back of the magazine, and also the coveted back page."

When confronted with this elaborate advertising program the amazed reader recalls the published pledge of the two national parties at the conventions of 1932, to "rightly and manly prevent the return of the saloon," "the saloon and attendant abuses," "the enactment of such measures as will promote temperance," "to bring the liquor traffic under complete supervision and control."

Upon two occasions after his election Mr. Roosevelt publicly pledged his word that while the Eighteenth Amendment was deemed the saloon should not be allowed to return. To quote his words "By no possibility, at any time or under any conditions at any place or under any circumstances, shall that institution, the saloon, or its equivalent, be allowed to return to American life."

Perhaps this explains why at the recent Democratic Convention neither the platform nor any one of the fifty-three speakers so much as mentioned the subject of repeal of the prohibition amendment, though that was one of the promises in the 1932 platform which was carried out.

The Newly Organized Third Party recognizes that the temperance cause is not a dead issue and seems willing to include it in the program for social reform.

The Prohibition Party is also still active in many states and has as its candidate Dr. D. Leigh Colvin, for president. Mrs. Colvin and their daughter Virginia are also well known figures in the fight against liquor. Both took conspicuous part in the Five State Conference recently held at Ocean Grove, N. J. Mrs. Colvin is President of the New York State W. C. T. U. Seated with her on the platform through the sessions were, Mrs. Ella Black, President, of Pennsylvania; Mrs. Nodcock, President, of New Jersey; Mrs. Waller, President, of Delaware, and Mrs. Mary R. Haslup, President, of Maryland.
