AUTO CRASH FATAL TO PHYSICIAN

Dr. Benjamin Robert Benson, Jr., member of the well-known Baltimore county family of physicians, was killed Tuesday in an automobile crash on the Jarrettsville pike, a short time after he had ushered a new life into the world at the home of a maternity patient.

The fatal accident occurred in a dense fog on a hill about six miles north of Towson. Dr. Benson's car was in collision with a coal truck. The machines sideswiped, the left side of Dr. Benson's car being torn away by the impact. The coupe was hurled from the road and against a bank. Dr. Benson died from a fractured skull and internal injuries.

The physician was a graduate of the Franklin High School, Baltimore county; the Boys' Latin School, in Baltimore, and the University of Maryland Medical School, class of 1907. He was a son of Dr. B. Robert Benson, who for many years practiced medicine in Baltimore county.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Elsie Benson; a son, B. Robert Benson, III, and two brothers, physicians, Dr. Charles Benson, resident physician at Tome School, Port Deposit, and Dr. Emory Benson, of Cockeysville.

"TOVARICH" AT AUDITORIUM, BALTIMORE, WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 28

Gilbert Miller has long been known as a producer of fine plays so it is not surprising to learn that he is the manager who will present "Tovarich", the Robert E. Sherwood adaptation of the Jacques Deval play that has met with such brilliant success through Europe. The play will be presented by Mr. Miller at the Auditorium for one week beginning September 28th. It will open in New York on October 14th.

Mr. Miller is not unaccustomed to success, having produced such hits as "Berkeley Square", "Journey's End", "The Petrified Forests", and the reigning triumph of last season and this, "Victoria Regina". The international manager has been so consistent that the mere mention of his name in connection with a play gives assurance of its quality.

"Tovarich" features Maria Abba, celebrated European actress, and John Halliday, who is well known to American audiences. It ran for 800 performances in Paris, and played in London for the unique and profitable period of "a year and a day". The play is said to deal with a pair of Russian aristocrats who accept positions as servants in the home of a well-to-do Parisian family. The complications that ensue are witty in Mr. Sherwood's best manner.

Maria Abba is making her American debut in this play. One of the foremost actresses on the Continent, she has toured triumphantly through both Europe and South America with a repertoire including plays by Shaw, Molnar, and Pirandello. The Italian dramatist dedicated two of his most successful plays to her, "Trovatori" and "As You Desire Me". She is the leading actress of Italy, where she has her own company.

"Tovarich" marks something of a turning point in the brilliant career of lanky Robert E. Sherwood. Until he finally decided to make an English version of Mr. Deval's play the American playwright had always been content to write original works, "Tovarich", however, made such an impression on him that he felt compelled to deviate from his hard and fast rule about originality. During the past few years Mr. Sherwood has made such contributions to the American theatre as "The Road to Rome", "Reunion in Vienna", "The Petrified Forest", and "Idiot's Delight", which won the Pulitzer Prize last season.

The production is done in Mr. Miller's best style. He has directed "Tovarich" personally, and the manager has gathered a distinguished cast to support Miss Abba. Heading the list is the featured player, John Halliday, and the cast also includes Ernest Lawford, Cecil Humphreys and Frederick Worlock.
