WATERWAY IMPROVEMENTS

Five Delegations Of Marylanders Plead For Waterway Improvements—Four Projects Are Located In Shore Areas

Washington, Feb. 16—Five delegations of Marylanders, sponsoring that number of waterway projects, four on the Eastern Shore and one in Southern Maryland, were today heard by the board of engineers for rivers and harbors of the War Department.

Representative Goldsborough headed delegations from Tilghman Island, Talbot county; North East, Cecil county; Rock Hall, Kent county, and sponsors of a canal connecting Oak Creek and Plaindealing Creek, in Talbot county.

Commerce Values Cited The delegation sponsoring the dredging of a channel and anchorage basin in Black Walnut harbor, near the mouth of the Choptank river, was headed by George T. Harrison, of Tilghman. This project is also being supported by the Maryland Sportsmen's Luncheon Club.

Governor Nice and Mayor Jackson of Baltimore and Senators Tydings and Radcliffe, who were unable to attend the hearing, sent telegrams to the board urging favorable consideration.

Ralph C. Sharratts, who represented the Sportsmen's Club of Baltimore, cited the advantages that would accrue to the sea-food industry as well as from providing a harbor of refuge for sport fishermen.

He also called attention of the board to a message from the Maryland Yacht Club, with approximately 500 members, urging a favorable decision by the board.

FARMERS MEETINGS TO PRECEDE SPRING FARMING OPERATIONS

Anxious to get their programs well under way before spring farm work begins, organized farmers of the state will crowd a large number of meetings into the next few weeks, according to a schedule released from the Baltimore office of the Maryland Farm Bureau.

The first series of two groups of meetings to promote cooperative marketing of livestock and wool is being held this week. Three meetings each are being held in Queen Annes and Talbot counties on February 24 and 26 and a county-wide meeting of livestock and wool producers on February 25 in Kent county.

Next week a series of five meetings, covering all sections of the state are to be held for Farm Bureau leaders to develop the 1937 program of county work on the program and membership of the organization.

Attending these meetings will be Vernon Vaniman, widely known farm bureau organization leader who represents the American Farm Bureau Federation offices of Chicago. Starting Monday, these meetings are scheduled on successive days at Upper Marlboro, Salisbury, Easton, Bel Air and Frederick.

The second group of the series of cooperative livestock and wool meetings will be held in March 15 to 18 covering counties on the Western Shore, with exact dates and places to be announced. Farm Bureau and Tobacco Growers Association leaders of Southern Maryland will meet on Feb. 25 at Upper Marlboro to arrange for the marketing of this most important crop of that section of the state.

Three County Farm Bureau annual banquets are also scheduled for coming weeks. Baltimore County's organization banquets at Sparks High School on Feb. 25. Farm Bureau banquets are scheduled for Howard county on March 24, Talbot county on April 1, and Cecil county April 2.

FOXCATCHER FARM'S FAIRY HILL WINS \$50,000 SANTA ANITA DERBY

Fairy Hill, William duPont's entry from his Foxcatcher Farm, at Fair Hill, Cecil county, was the winner in the \$50,000 Santa Anita Derby, over a field of twenty-one 3-year-olds, at the Santa Anita California track on Monday. Fairy Hill was ridden by Jockey Peters and proved the best horse in a big field of notables in the horse-flesh line.

Other Projects Listed

The next project taken up by the board was the proposed improvement of North East river. Several citizens of that section said that the construction of an adequate channel and anchorage basin would result in reviving the sea food industry of the upper bay, and also attract many people from Delaware, New Jersey and Pennsylvania who are unable to find adequate facilities for their boats.

The sponsors of the Rock Hall project urged the board to provide an adequate channel and anchorage for a safe harbor of refuge for a great number of boats. The estimated cost of this improvement is \$55,000, with \$1,500 annually for maintenance.

The final project to be heard was the proposal for constructing a canal connecting Oak creek and Plaindealing creek.

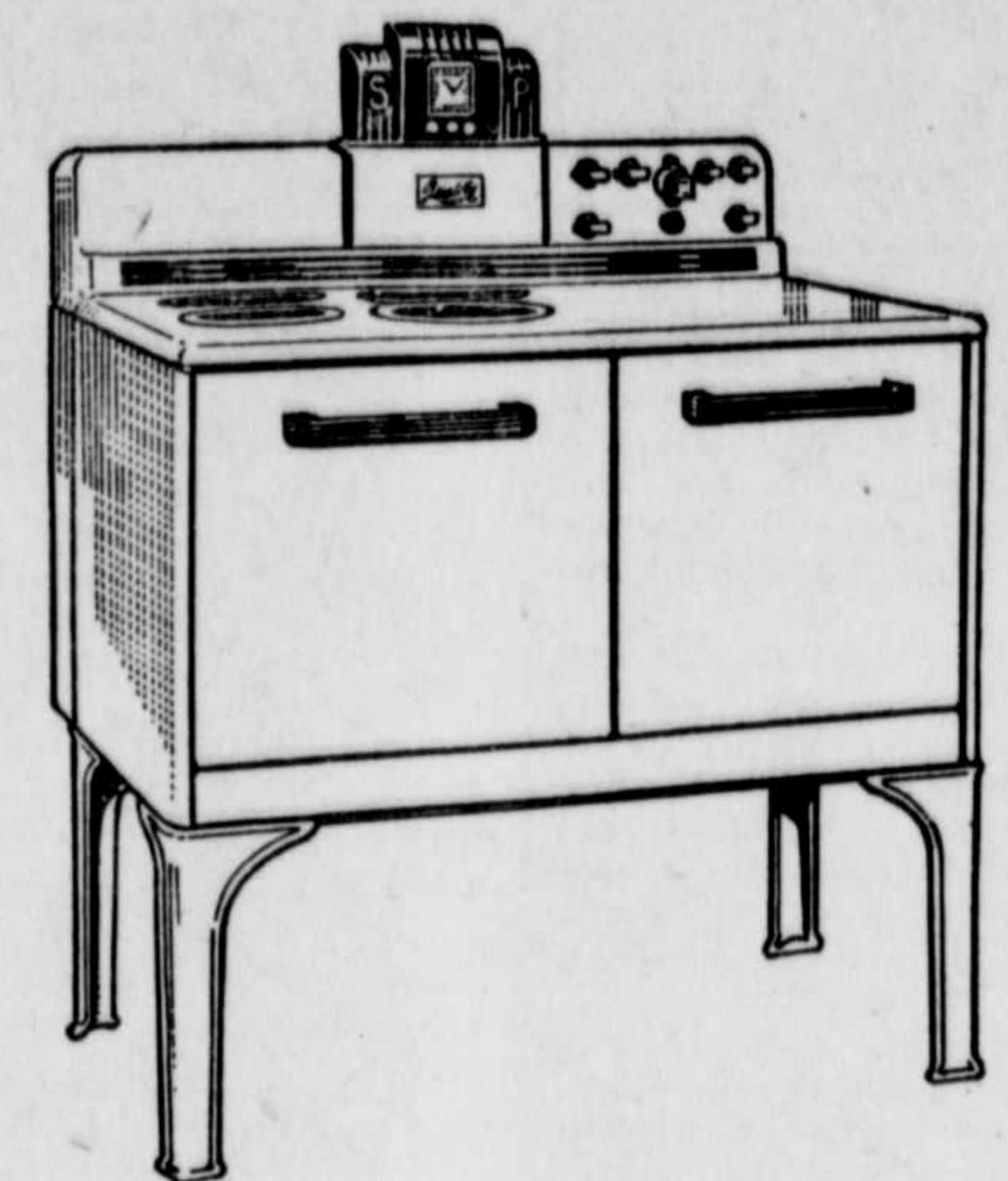
