WPA Display At Little Theatre Also Shows Boats,

Buildings

A group of seventeen water colors, of which twelve were sketches of colonial ter of the late John Emory and Rebec- key, H. Scott Starkey, R. E. Phillips homes and public buildings in Queen ca Bailey Emory. In October, 1866, she and J. L. Wallace. Anne's county and five marine views were exhibited by George Hall of Chester at the Little Theatre last week in connection with the stage performances.

The collection of colonial homes includes Bloomingdale, Bolingly, the Hermitage, Reed's Creek, Walnut Grove, Melfield, Blakeford, Readbourne and Old Point. The public buildings included two views of the Courthouse and one of the Centreville Elementary School as it will appear after the additions are complete.

In the marine pictures are shown two sketches of bugeyes, two of two-masted schooners and a log canoe.

The water colors are completed in modified architectural drawing style and aim to show the historical appearances of the building sketched. At Bolingly an original hood is added to the present structure while a wing is affixed to Bloomingdale. Most of the buildings are shown in the original brick red instead of their present colors.
