Late Tomato Crop Good. Sugar Corn Season Is Winding Up

Tomato prices are holding up well in Queen Anne's county with canneries expected to operate five or six weeks more. On Wednesday growers around Centreville were receiving 30c a basket on the farms. Growers around Sudlersville were getting 35c on Monday.

Late tomatoes are showing up much better than the early ones. Early plants frequently lacked strength and more than the usual amount of fruit was sun-kissed. Better yields are expected from the late crop.

Estimates of the size of the county crop are hard to get, chiefly because patches are spotty, good ones and not so good ones being found in the same neighborhood. Prices also have an effect on the tomato yield. When the fruit is plentiful and prices low growers tend to leave a portion of the crop

This year when prices are good, growers are picking every last salable tomato as well as the little fellows no larger than a golf ball. A much larger proportion of the fruit will be gather- Tabler
