



# 6 Presented

Court Term Opened Monday. Judge Keating Charges

With Chief Judge William Mason Shehan, and Associate Judges Thomas J. Keating and J. Owen Knotts on the Bench, the fall term of the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's county convened Monday morning in Centre-

Following the drawing of the Grand Jury of which Charles M. West yas appointed Foreman, Judge Keating delivered the charge to the Grand

Before Judge Keating launched into his chareg to the Grand Jury, he said he wished to commend the Board of County Commissioners and all those responsible for improvements at the courthouse. A toilet has been installed in the Judges' quarters, also one in the Grand Jury room. These improvements have been recommended in Grand Jury reports for many years. Judge Keating

described these changes as "adequate." Judge Keating pointed out that there are no conditions existing in the county that require any special charge. That does not mean that there have been no infractions, he said. He told of the speed with which Grand Juries throughout the Circuit have been completing their labors, but cautioned the jurors against rushing through their

Judge Keating in the charge brought out the fact that there is no evidence of organized crime in the county. He stated the "People of the Elastern Shore are to be congratulated on their good behavior. They are quiet and peace loving the right appeals to them and they abhor wrong." He explained the work of the Grand Jury and pointed out their duty in investigating and violations of the three laws that are always brought to the attention of the Grand Inquest -The Defaulters Act, applying to people handling public monies; the Abortion Act and the Narcotics Drug or Harrison Act.
