Pilot Performing For Pictures Fails To Avoid Piling. 5 Others Hurt

Two persons were killed and five others injured in a stunning boat crash at Chestertown Tuesday when the speedboat Mickey Mouse II racing up the Chester river at a forty-a-milean-hour gait smashed against the pier of the Chester River Yacht Club.

The dead were Miss Jean Cooper, 17, who was thrown from the boat against a pier piling, suffered a fractured skull and other injuries and died in the Kent and Queen Anne's Hospital, and Richard Richardson, 21, pilot of the Mickey Mouse, who incurred head injuries in the collision, went down with his shattered boat and drowned. His body was recovered several hours later near the spot where the speedboat sank. Those injured, all of whom suffered from shock as well as minor hurts, were Marian Thomas, granddaughter of Mrs. William Durney; Margaret A. Dukes, Helen Strong, Emily Jones and Eleanor White. The first three were thrown
