RESAWAY.—The team of the veterinarian of Cambridge, Sam Jackson, ran away on Sunday afternoon, crossed the rail road bridge, and after turning numerous corners finally stopped at Bramble's Hotel without any damage being done. FATAL ACCIDENT.—As Wm. T. Claridge, a tenant of John Creighton, Esq., was returning home from the primary school at Cambridge on Saturday afternoon with Mr. Haddaway Mills, the horse of the latter took fright near Windsor Bridge and ran away. Mr. Claridge attempted to spring from the vehicle and fell violently to the earth, his death was almost instantaneous, and it is supposed his neck was broken. Mr. Mills kept his seat and escaped unhurt.

THE CONVENTION.—In pursuance of notice, the Democratic nominating county Convention met at Cambridge on Monday last. The Convention organized at Hayward Hall at 10 o'clock A. M. by the election of Mr. Wm. H. Woodson Esq. as Vice President, and Sam. P. Smith and Thos. H. Hobbins as Secretaries. On motion of Mr. Hooper, C. Sullivan, J. H. Johnson and Col. D. A. Fenton were admitted to seats in the Convention. Mr. Woodson, on the motion of Mr. Goslin, a committee on credentials was appointed, and on motion of Mr. Webb two door keepers were appointed. Mr. Webb also used every honorable effort to secure the election of the nominees of the Convention. On motion of Mr. Holt it was resolved that a candidate for the Convention who might be a candidate for the Convention be requested to withdraw and that his delegation be empowered to fill the vacancy. On motion the Convention adjourned for one hour.
