Mr. Blair (Dem., Mo.) offered a resolution, which was adopted, directing the Committee on Investigation and Retrenchment to inquire whether any Minister of the United States in any foreign country is engaged in any mining company...

Mr. Davis, of Kentucky, offered a resolution directing the Committee on Investigation and Retrenchment, to ascertain and report whether the President has, or has heretofore had any interest, direct or contingent, in any contracts to do work for the United States...

Mr. Logan (Rep., Ill.) charged that certain Senators who had urged the passage of an amnesty bill had voted for amendments intended to delay the bill until a committee should have reported on the claim of one man to a seat in the Senate...
