LONDON, August 24.
Copy of a letter from capt. William Mudge,
of his majesty's late ship *Blanche*, to Wm.
Marsden, esq. dated on board the French
national ship *Topaze*, 22d July, 1805.
SIR,
I am sorry to inform you of the loss of
his majesty's ship *Blanche*, which was cap-
tured by a French squadron, as per margin?—
but, thank God, she was not destined to
bear French colors, or to assist the fleet of
the enemy.
On Friday morning, July 19, in lat. 29,
20, N. long. 66, 44, W. (weather hazy)
at eight, four sail were seen off the weather
cat-head, three ships and a brig on the op-
posite tack, under easy sail. I kept to the
wind until we were near enough to distin-
guish colors. I then made the necessary
signals to ascertain whether they were ene-
mies. At 10, when abreast about 3 miles
distant, they all bore up and hoisted Eng-
lish ensigns; but, from the make of the
Union, and color of the bunting, with
other circumstances, I concluded they were
French, and therefore determined to sell
the ship as dearly as possible, (for sailing
was out of the question, the *Blanche* hav-
ing little or no copper on these last nine
months, and sailed very heavy). Having
brought to, with the mainsail in the brails,
at 11, the commodore ran ed up within 2
cables length, shifting his colors and gave
us his broadside. When within pistol-shot
she received ours—the action became warm
and steady, the ships never without hail of
each other, running large, under easy sail,
Le *Departement des Landes* on the starboard
quarter, and the two corvettes close astern.
At forty-five minutes past 11, the ship be-
came ungovernable, and was reduced to a
perfect wreck; the sails totally destroyed,
ten shots in the foremast, (expecting it to
fall every minute) the mainmast and rigging
cut to pieces, seven guns dismounted, and
the crew reduced to one hundred and nine-
ty, and the rest falling fast, with no proba-
bility of escape, I called a council of offi-
cers for their opinion, who deemed it only
sacrificing the lives of the remainder of as
brave a crew as ever fought, to hold out
longer, as there was not the smallest pros-
pect of success; I therefore at 12, order-
ed the colors to be struck, and was imme-
diately hurried on board the commodore.—
At 6, the officers who had charge of the
Blanche returned, and reported the ship
to be sinking fast, on which she was fired;
and in about an hour after she sunk, for the
magazine had been some time under water.
Thus, sir, fell the *Blanche*, and I trust
the defence made by her officers and gal-
lant crew, will meet their lordships' ap-
probation. I have the honor to be, &c.

P. S. Including every individual when
the ship went into action, there were but
215, 30 men being in prizes, and 8 left on
board one of the frigates at Jamaica. I
cannot exactly ascertain those killed and
wounded, as the crews were promiscuously
distributed to the different ships of the
squadron, but those that came immediately
under my notice, were John Nichols, quar-
ter-master, killed; William Marshé, able,
killed; Thomas Mullins, do. do.; James
Forode, do. do.; Edward Marsh, do. do.;
Nimrod Lunce, marine, do.; Wm. Jones,
do. (drummer) do.; Wm. Stratton, boy,
do.; Mr. William Hewett, boatswain,
with ten seamen, and ten marines, wound-
ed.

BY THIS DAY'S MAILS.
BOSTON, October 22.
FROM HOLLAND, Sept. 2.
Letters are received in town from Am-
sterdam, by an arrival on Tuesday last,
which contain the following information:
—“Seven vessels have arrived at this
place, which were carried into England, and
after a short detention, released. This
circumstance has caused, in some measure,
a depression in the markets. There is a
report to-day, that the Austrian ambassador
has quitted Paris; a continental war is there-
fore now considered as inevitable.”

FROM GIBRALTAR.
Captain Rogers, arrived here yesterday
from Gibraltar, in 34 days passage, brings
accounts, that the combined French and
Spanish fleets were still at Cadiz; that ad-
mirals Calder and Collingwood, were be-
fore that place, with a squadron of about 17
sail; and that Lord Nelson, with an addition-
al force, was hourly expected to arrive on
that station, for the purpose of taking com-
mand of the blockade.
[According to this account, then, the
various rumors of a great naval engagement,
fall to the ground.]
Captain Rogers further advises, that the
French and Spanish troops, in the neigh-
borhood of Gibraltar, were said to amount
to between 20 and 30,000 men, and that
on the event of a return of the calamity,
which proved so fatal to the garrison and
inhabitants during the last year, it was ex-
pected an attack would be made. At pre-
sent the troops enjoyed great health, and

were prepared to meet the enemy at every
point. The differences between this coun-
try and Tripoli, being fully adjusted, a
part of the United States squadron, then
lying at Gibraltar, and consisting of 4 fri-
gates, 2 schooners, and 2 bomb brigs, were
expected to sail immediately for America.
No accounts had been received at Malaga
or Gibraltar, of any hostile disposition hav-
ing been recently discovered on the part of
Tunis, or any of the other Barbary powers
against this country.

October 23.
Arrived, the brig Gov. Sumner, capt.
Rogers, 37 days from Malaga, and 34 from
Gibraltar. Left at Malaga, — Smith and
a brig belonging to Dr. Kating, for North
Europe; three vessels belonging to the
Southward, names unknown, capt. R. Nev-
ing loaded at quarantine. The brig Neu-
trality, for Boston, sailed four days before.
The big Albatross, Wilds, from Boston,
touched at Malaga, Sept. 9, and proceeded
up.—Left at Gibraltar, the brig Rover,
Luce, and Moses Myers, Breck, of Boston,
and seven others, belonging to other ports,
from Cadiz, all condemned, vessels and
cargoes, and sold at auction, on account of
the breach of blockade of Cadiz. Spoke
nothing. Very healthy at Malaga and Gib-
raltar.
Same day, via quarantine, brig Enter-
prise, Gage, St. Croix, 25 days.

NEW-YORK, October 20.
Arrived, the ship American, Bearnes,
in 53 days from Belfast. Left at Belfast,
the brig Mary, Clark, of N. York. Octo-
ber 17, on St. George's Banks, the Ameri-
can was boarded by the British frigate
Cambrian, and had the following steege
passengers pressed: Wm. Collins, Thomas
Forsyth, Hugh Carey, Hugh Laherty, Tho's
Addison, James Rowan, James Futton,
Hugh M-Murray, Robert Hamilton, Daniel
Duffie, Moses Martin, John Newsam, Wm.
White, John M-Brice, and 2 seamen. Cab-
bin passengers in the American, Mr. Bell
and lady, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Charn, and
several in the steerage.
October 30.
On Monday evening an attempt was

Mr. Thomas T. White, in Pearl-street.
The flames were observed to issue through
the cellar window by the watch; and were
extinguished without any material injury.

fice, Insurance offices, and Coffee-House,

and opened for the transaction of business
at the usual places.
