COMMUNICATION. Captain Whitby has been acquitted, and every day's Gazette presents us with some pretended outrage of the British command-ers. It is high time the American people were put on their guard against these Genetlike attempts to exasperate them against one of the belligerent powers, for they ought all to be alike to us.

It is not necessary to dust our fingers with the rusty works of Vattet or Grotius, to prove that either of the parties at war have a right to search neutral vessels at sea; nor can we doubt that every captain has positive orders to execute his duty in this respect. Very little injury or inconvenience would happen to the neutral trader, if the right was fairly submitted to by the masters of our merchant vessels; and such of the owners as are not inclined to bring the government into difficulties or their country into contempt, would do well to instruct the masters of their vessels accordingly.

To explain myself further, and induce them so to do, I will will relate two circumstances that occurred within my own knowledge, during my former travels; the last of which, I think, will shew when a master ought to heave to; and the first, when it may be excusable to run away.

In 1799, I took my passage in an American schooner from St. Sebastians to New-York: before we lost sight of land, we were chased by two or three small armed vessels. which fired several times at the schooner within shot, but did not strike her. A day or two after, off cape Ortugal, we were dis covered by a large vessel with British colors, which proved to be a frigate, and which, after chasing us from morning to night, and getting us nearly within reach of her shot, fired to bring the schooner to. The master, thinking it vain to attempt to escape, then determined to submit to be searched; but the next moment the friente carried away her foretopmast, and we made all sail and altered our course to get away. To our great surprise and mertification, the Englishman had not lost sight of us; and the next morning he was as near to us as he had been at the commencement of the preceding day. We therefore resigned ourselves to our expected fate; but the captain of the frigate, having been probably put to more inconvenience than the loss of his foretopmast, by being taken out of his course, soon left us to congratulate ourselves on the prospect of

an uninterrupted passage. On our arrival at New-York, I found that the vessel and cargo, which were worth 40,000 dollars, were under the direction of other names than those contained in the papers, and the property at least doubtful; so that I was no longer surprised at the temerity of the master of the schooner, who in many respects was a clever fellow, and really con gratulated him and myself that we had not een obliged to call at Cork or Plymouth.

In 1800, being about to return from Hispaniola, I took my passage from Port-au-Prince in a schooner belonging and bound to Baltimore. We passed at anchor in Heneaga an armed ship, without being hailed. About half passage we were chased by a gun brig under British colors, that overhauled us very fast, and coming near, fired a gun; but our master, although be had nothing but ballast, kept his course, and the brig passed within pistol shot under his stern; but the captain, who, it must be allowed, was endued with some forbearance, but with contempt of us, contented himself with examining the name on the stern, which, fortunately for the owners and ourselves too perhaps, could neither be silenced nor bore off by our hero of a master.

To these I cannot omit adding, as long as I have room, (and I hope you will find it, Mr. Printer, a little history) I had from a gentleman who was once in office, and always will be entitled to much more than common credence from his countrymen.

One of the consuls of the United States, destined to the place of his appointment, took his passage in an American vessel, which happened to be commanded by one of those would-be sovereigns of the sea who had scarcely learnt the use of his quadrant, and who will tyrannize over a cabin boy, if no other subject presents. They were bro't to by an English ship of war, and the lieutenant received such treatment as induced him to take off almost all our master's men, out of revenge; upon which the consul went on board the ship, and representing, in a ge-nerous, candid manner, the hardship there would be in inflicting a punishment on him-self and the owners for the indiscretion of the master, the British officer sent him off with every man, and the most polite good

wishes for a speedy passage.
Such, I apprehend, should be the conduct of every person charged with the interest of others; and such, I am bold to say, would be the issue, nine hundred and ninety-nine times out of a thousand.

Mr. Wickman said he should rely upon the
