## Foreign Intelligence,

Received at Philadelphia, by the *Sh. Ceres, C. Angus*, from *Liverpool*.

LONDON, June 25.

WEDNESDAY his Majesty was pleased to issue his royal proclamation, for continuing the bounties to seamen and landmen who shall enter themselves on board his Majesty's ships of war, from the 30th of June to the 31st of August next inclusive.

It is computed that the number of men already raised for the navy since the commencement of the present alarm, amounts to 16,000.

June 26. The Alert sloop passed Gibraltar the 25th ult. and on the 28th following, being about ten leagues S. E. of Cape St. Vincent's, fell in with a fleet of eight sail of Spanish ships of the line, and did not lose sight of them for three days.

The 25th of May, the Hannah, from Cadiz, passed through a fleet of ten sail of Spanish line of battle ships, about ten leagues W. of Cape St. Vincent.

While the Hannah lay at Cadiz there was the hottest press ever remembered; men of all descriptions were taken, and none could escape the vigilance of the gangs on that service.

Extract of a letter from *Portsmouth*.

"In consequence of orders received by Admiral Barrington, this morning, to hold the fleet (consisting of 22 sail of the line) in readiness for sailing at a moment's notice, it seems we are all to embark on Saturday. Where we are to go, I cannot as yet pretend to inform you: but the report this morning was, that there were ten sail of the Spanish line cruising off Cape St. Vincent; and by letters which were brought in a transport which arrived here on Tuesday night from Gibraltar, we are told that six Spanish line of battle ships had just passed the Gut. These letters also say, that the new Emperor of Morocco has over-loaded the garrison of Gibraltar with presents, and is determined to go to war with the whole world, except his good friends the English. Upon the whole it is most likely that a cruise off Cadiz will be the object of our destination.

Last week twenty tenders were taken up in addition to those already in commission, and orders have been given to the Excise and Custom-houses, not to release the men taken on board smuggling vessels, but to secure them for the fleet.

Yesterday morning orders were issued from the Admiralty, to press from all protections whatever, in order to man immediately the Hannibal, Royal Sovereign, Royal George, and Gibraltar, now nearly ready for sea at Plymouth.

On Wednesday orders were sent to get ready five fire-ships, and four bomb-ketches, one at Deptford and three at Woolwich.

A private contract was made the same day, to deliver 3000 ton of cannon-balls at Portsmouth and Plymouth: and also for 35,000 hammocks, and 20,000 beds.
