THERE are many English works of merit, which are scarcely to be found in the United States—and among this class "The Select Remains of the Reverend John Mason" hold an exalted station. Mr. Mason was a man of more than ordinary talents and learning; but particularly eminent as a Christian. He was a minister of the established church of England, yet destitute of those sectarian prejudices which often produce dissensions among real Christians. For a continued sense of religion on the soul, for love of God, and zeal for his holy cause, he had few equals. The writings of that man could not want merit of whom Baxter could say, "He was the glory of the Church of England!"

THE "SELECT REMAINS" which we propose to publish, are particularly calculated to benefit the Christian, and enquiring soul. The first part of this work contains the more important truths, thrown together in distinct sentences, of most of the subjects interesting the Christian, and the soul that seeks for happiness—as of God, Christ, heaven, hell, repentance, faith, death, eternity, pride and humility, &c. It comprehends, also, some serious advice to youth; religious observations by way of simile; doubts and fears of a tender conscience answered; and rules by which we may ascertain our growth in grace, and whether we are indeed God's children. The second part contains a number of letters from the author, written in that truly elevated and Christian spirit, which is calculated to raise the soul from earth to heaven. From it we may learn, briefly, the nature of Christianity, and the character of a Christian—our duty to God, to our fellow-creatures, and ourselves.

The author, in this work, was not desirous of obtaining credit for elegant composition, but of collecting as many useful truths as possible in a small compass. Hence it is a work, not to delight the imagination, but to improve the heart—and calculated to supply the place of larger treatises, to those who have not the means to obtain them, or the time to read them.

On the score of recommendations, should one half that has been said in favor of this little work, be introduced here, the prospectus would be larger than the volume itself. Suffice it to say, that the most eminent Divines in every part of the U. States where the work has been known, have said all in its favor, that language could express. With regard to its merits and usefulness, Christians of every denomination have expressed the same opinions, and the same sentiments.

IN COUNCIL,

ANNAPOLIS, March 4, 1822.

ORDERED, That the act entitled, An act relating to the payment of pensions, granted by this state, be published five times in all the papers of this state, and the National Intelligencer.

AN ACT Entitled, An act relating to the payment of pensions granted by this state.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer of the Western Shore, shall not after the passage of this act, pay any order drawn by any person, who now is or may hereafter be placed on the pension list, unless the same be accompanied with an oath or affirmation of such pensioner as the case may be; to be taken before some Mayor, Notary Public, Alderman or Justice of the Peace, of the town, county or state, where such pensioner shall reside, that the person or persons so signing the said order, is the person to whom the said pension was granted.

Sec. 2. And be enacted, That the Governor and Council be requested to cause this law to be published in such newspapers as they may deem advisable, to give the most general circulation to the same.
