ted States shall consist of not less than One Vice Admiral;

Two Rear Admirals; Thirty Captains; Thirty Mssters' Commandant; Two hundred Lieutenants;

Four hundred Midshipmen, including those who have passed examination; Thirty five Surgeons;

Pitty Assistant Screeons; Thirty five Pursers; Ten Sailing Masters; Twenty four Boatswains; Twenty-four Gunners; Twenty tour Carpenters; and

Twenty Sailmakers. And the President of the United States is hereby authorized and required to reduce the number of officers, at such time or times, within the present year, as he may deem expedient, so that the number of each grade shall not exceed the number herein
