The imports into the United States, during the year ending Sept. 30th last, amounted to \$74,492,517, less, by about fourteen millions, than they were the year previous and less than they have been in any year since 1821. The exports during the last year, amounted to \$72. 358,671, differing very little from those of the year ending Sept. 50, 1828 : but with the exception of that year, less than they have been since 1821. The amount of domestic articles exported last! year was 55,700,193. In 1816. the amount exceeded 64 millions.
