Referring to the pension claim, Ctf. No. 564, 793, of Nathan Johnson, late private Co. "D", 7th U.S.C. Vol. Inf., and your reports therein, under dates of July 26th and Sept. 23d, 1897, you are advised as follows:

Your report of July 26, after examination by the reviewer, was returned to you, together with the papers of the claim, and you were charged with faulty and insufficient work upon the ground that you failed to exhaust all means of information within the limits of your district.
