James Taylor, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
said pension claim, deposes and says: Age about 58. Occupation
Sabon. P.O. and Residence, Centerville
Md.

I was a private in Co. K. 39. U.S. Infy;
from about March 1864, and was
discharge about Dec. 1865.

This is all the service I ever rendered
the United States Government.

I am now receiving a pension
under the New Law of \$6.00
payable at the Washington Agency.
No Sir. I did not know that
I had a claim pending under
the Old Law.

I first made application for pension
4 or 5 years ago.

I then claimed for Rupture
and Rheumatism

These were the only disabilities
I had in the army. Other than the
Rheum. and Rupture, I was a
sound man when I was
discharged from the army.

Yes, I was sunstruck while in the
Army and I applied for pension on account
of it, but the effects of it wore off and
I do not claim for it any longer.
