On this *23* day of *March*, 1893, at
Baltimore, County of *City*
 State of *Md*, before me, *G. B. Hamlet*, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared *William H*
Gray, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid
 pension claim, deposes and says: I am 68 years of age,
 a gentlemen's nurse, reside and my P.O.
 address is 425 St. Marys St, this City,
 I have known this Clint intimately
 for the last 20 years or more, for 7 years
 from about 1876 he was my next door
 neighbor on St Marys St this City. I knew
 of this Clint before the war, and saw him
 frequently before his enlistment, he was
 a Coachman, previous to and after his enlistment,
 I did not know subsequent of him before the
 war to now say as to his exact physical
 Condition, other than I considered him of
 good health, After the war I met him
 previous to 1876, and he was then complaining
 of poor health, and was at times sick,
 I cant say as to the exact nature of
 his sickness or duration of same, I
 am sure he was in poor health and
 not a sound man after his return from
 service, I cant say as to date of his
 return from service, or as to his army
 service. Since 1876 he has failed
 in health very fast, sometime in the
 early 80ies, while he lived next door
 to me on St Marys St, he had a
 stroke of Paralysis, which affected his
 entire right side, and has made him
