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of Howard County, locality not known to claimant,
 another one, Charles Peal is in the Penitentiary for stealing.

My conclusion is that Claimant acting in the capacity of
 a Coachman for a number of years before enlistment, gave satis-
 faction to his employers, and enjoyed fair health, or if he did
 not it was not noticed. There is no evidence of disability
 in the service except what is shown by the record. After
 discharge he was engaged for seven years at his old employ-
 ment of Stableman and Coachman, during that time there
 is no evidence of pensionable degree of disability. After being
 discharged from that employment he had to work at some
 thing requiring greater physical exertion, and has at times
 been troubled with pains and aches such as laboring men
 generally are subject to. He has had no constant employer
 consequently it is hard to get at his accurate ability as a labor-
 ing man, but he has complained of being unwell, and unable
 to work. He had an abscess in his groin some years ago from
 causes not incident to the service, and an attack of rheumatism
 or lumbago in the winter of 1881 & 1882, but there is no evi-
 dence of continuous disease of stomach, nor is it shown by
 his statement. I cannot see what disability he could be
 rated for in a pension Certificate, consequently recommend
 rejection.
