time. Yes I remember I did make a statement  
there and I remember I was sworn to it by the  
Magistrate in the office there. Now, I do not  
know the name of the young man clerk or the  
Magistrate. The young man wears glasses and  
I remember there was a young lady there too.

It was the young man who wears glasses  
who fixed up the paper who swore me to it.
