I am the claimant for pension
as the widow of John Gibson who was a
soldier in Co. A. 7 Regt. U.S. Troops.

I was married to Gibson at
Easton Talbot Co. Md. Sept. 17. 1884.
and we lived together till he died
at Unionville Charles Co. Md. 4 mi. from
Easton May. 29. 1889.

I had no children by him.
Our home was near Easton all the time
of our married life. I had known him
8 or 10 years before our marriage.
But was his home ever since the
war.

I was born on "Pecker" Island Queen
Anne Co. Md. - belonged to Pecker. At
 emancipation my mother sent me to
Baltimore to get some learning and
then I went to the vicinity of Easton
