On this teenth day of May, 1902, at
Baltimore City, county of _____
 State of Maryland, before me, Edwin Howard, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared _____

Elizabeth C. Rosier, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special
 examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am 55 years of age, my occupation is that
 of a laundress taking in clothes to wash. I
 reside at 525 Mosher Street, Baltimore, Md.
 I formerly lived at 1304 Division Street, but I
 left there when my husband died and I sold the
 house - I now have two rooms here for my mother
 and myself. I was born and raised right
 here in Baltimore. My husband was raised
 in Queen Anne's Co, Md. I did not ^{meet} Mr. Rosier
 until the day he left the service - The day he
 was discharged I was working with his mother,
 she was cook and I was housemaid, at Miss
 Lees Buchanan on St Paul St, between Santiago
 and Pleasant street. The day he was discharged
 (about ^{four} six years before we were married) he came
 to see his mother, still wearing his uniform,
 and I then met him for the first time. I was
 married to Mr. Rosier by the Rev. James Peck,
 Charles Street Methodist Church, on Jan'y 25th
 1870 - Just at the close of the war (I for it by
 the fall of Richmond). I went on a visit to
 my husband's people at Centerville, Md. and
 stayed with them a month - his mother took
 me and I became acquainted with them. I
 am sure Mr. Rosier was never married before
 he married me otherwise I must have heard it
 from his people, and I kept company with him
 nearly four years before we got married - No. Six
 I was never married to anybody except to Mr.
