On this day and date below written, personally appeared the affiant whose signature is hereto affixed and who being duly sworn according to law testified as follows:

"My age is 78 years, I reside in Baltimore, Md., at No. 224 Helome Street,

I was not present at the marriage of the soldier James Connolds & the Plaintiff Elizabeth Loveday, but I am there eight after they were married and know that from that time ~~to~~ about 10 years before the war until the soldier's death they lived together and recognized each other as husband and wife. I make no regard less by all who knew them. I know that Catharine was the only child left by the soldier under 16 years of age at his death and that she is still living and is hopelessly insane, being entirely dependent upon the Plaintiff. I find that the Plaintiff has not remarried since the death of her husband and the election. That she owns no property, being entirely dependent upon her daily labor for support that she earns a sufficient quantity in washing & ironing. I send these facts from my personal knowledge with the parties mentioned. This testimony was all written in my presence and also from my own oral statements then made to me at the office of A. P. Lloyd on July 19, 1893, and that in making them I have not been aided or prompted by any written or printed statement or recital prepared for or dictated by any other person except the Hon. Commissioner of Pensions order 229.

ments then made;

stating also the time,
place, and person
when, where and to
whom he made such
oral statements, and
that in making the
same he did not use,
and was not aided or
prompted by any writ-
ten or printed state-
ment or recital, pre-
pared or dictated by
any other person; and
not attached as an ex-
hibit to his testimony.
