

DEPOSITION *R*Case of *Enoch Jolley*, No. 227,082On this *twenty sixth* day of *November*, 1884, at  
*Baltimore*, County of *Baltimore*State of *Maryland*, before me, *J. H. Simpson*, a  
Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared*William Weaver*, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-  
said pension claim, deposes and says: that his age is 70 years;

that he is by occupation a missionary of A. M. E. Church.

that his post office address and place of residence  
is 282 *Hambury Street* <sup>*between 7th & 8th Sts.*</sup> *Baltimore, Md.* andthat he was acquainted with the deceased soldier,  
*John Jolley*, late Private Co. D. 7<sup>th</sup> Regt. U. S. C. V. from about  
the time of his discharge up to the date of his death.Q. What was the deceased soldier's physical condition  
when you first became acquainted with him?A. Well he was in very poor health and had a bad  
cough. When he came home from the army he  
at once became identified with my church and  
it was then I first met him. I think he came  
to our church in the latter part of 1866 or for part  
of 1867. He was a feeble consumptive man with  
a bad cough during the whole period of my  
acquaintance with him up to his death. I have  
always been informed and so believed that he died  
of consumption. I am unable to state the month  
in which he died but his death occurred in  
1871. I know that it was warm weather. I fix  
the year of his death by the fact that I had been  
living at #282 *Hambury St.* from 1869, for two years  
when the deceased soldier moved within the second  
door of my house about three to four months prior to his  
death. That was in 1871.Q. Was the deceased soldier affected by any other  
disease or disability - than disease of lungs - while
