

DEPOSITION 4Case of Enoch Jolley, No. 227,052

On this twenty eighth day of November, 1884, at  
Baltimore, County of Baltimore  
 State of Maryland, before me, J. H. Simpson, a  
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared  
Isaac Johnson, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-  
 said pension claim, deposes and says: that age is 43 years; that  
 he is by occupation a waiter in restaurant; that  
 his post-office address and place of residence is  
No. 8 Sterling Street Baltimore, Md. and  
 that he was acquainted with the deceased soldier,  
John Jolley, late Private Co. D. 7<sup>th</sup> Regt. U.S.C. <sup>by</sup>  
 from the time of his enlistment in September 1863  
 up to the time of his discharge in the fall of 1864,  
 deponent being a member of said company during said  
 period. Deponent met the deceased <sup>in Baltimore</sup> previous or subsequent  
 to his service.

Q. What was the deceased soldier's physical condition during the period of his service?

A. For about the first year after he enlisted he was a very lively and hearty man, always ready for duty. After he was wounded at Fort Gibson Va. some time in Sept. 1864, he was in hospital for a long while. When he came to us again in Texas about ten or twelve months after he was wounded, he was sickly and was always full and ailing from that time up to the time of our discharge.

Q. How did he appear to be affected and of what did he complain while in Texas?

A. He had a very bad cough and complained of pains in his limbs, something like rheumatism. I remember that when we were drilling he would take a spell of coughing and have to go out of the ranks until he got through. He was a man that did not complain
