Case of John Armstrong

On this 17 day of February, 1930 at Baltimore county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me, W. H. Stovall, an inspector of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared Sarah Ringold, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am past 70 years old and the widow of Felix Ringold, post office address 812 China st, Baltimore Md. The late pensioner John Armstrong was a brother of mine and I will report that he died at this address Tuesday February 11, 1930 and was buried in Loudon Park Cemetery. John Armstrong left no widow surviving, and no children under the age of sixteen years. He had lived with me something over sixteen years and I nursed him and took care of him during his illness. He had been sick for several weeks before dying. John Armstrong was pensioned at \$72 and I am unable to find his certificate. I stood for the expense of the last sickness and burial of my brother John Armstrong who owned no property of any kind real or personal and was supported by the pension he received from the government. The Odd Fellows to which John Armstrong belonged will contribute toward the burial expenses but I do not know the amount they will give. John Armstrong left no money on deposit. I may file a claim for reimbursement of the expenses to the amount of the pension due John Armstrong at date of his death. I am certain that he died Tuesday February 11, 1930. His undertaker was Isaiah Brown & Son and Dr Franklin of Lee street was the attending physician. I have heard the foregoing deposition read and it is correct.
