Barnes, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
 said pension claim, deposes and says: *I am 51 years of age,*

*I do day labor; reside and my City-
 address is 112 Rope Walk Alley
 Baltimore Md.*

*I am the identical person who
 served as Robert Barnes Co, K, 19th
 U.S.C.T. I enlisted at Dorchester and
 was sworn into service at Benedict
 Md, in Dec, 1863. and was mustered
 out of service at Fort Federal Hill
 Baltimore Md, in Jan or Feb 1867-*

*I was in no other Military service,
 I rec'd no disability in service,
 Yes, I was a pensioner @ \$6 under
 the new law for rheumatism and
 piles, from the summer of 1891 till
 about one year ago. when my
 pension ceased. I cant say why
 my pension was stopped, Yes
 I did get a notice that my pension
 was suspended, Then I got another
 saying I was dropped from the
 Pension rolls, both notices came
 from the Pension Bureau, but I
 cant now say as to exact contents
 of said notices. I have since then
 made application for restoration.*

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
