Mr A. P. Lloyd Cor. St. Paul & Saratoga Sts This City, has been my Atty at all times and he has been my only Atty, in my pension matters. I never paid Lloyd or any one any fee in my pension claim. He (Lloyd) informed me that the Govt paid him \$10 fee when my pension was granted. I made my first Application in the summer of 1890, shortly after Congress passed the new Law. I then heard that a man was around the City securing names of ex soldiers who were entitled to pensions under the new law. Virgil Dawkins informed me of this & said that the man would be at his (Dawkins) claim house, on Warner st, near Montgomery, This City, that afternoon so I went there that afternoon and met this man. I never knew his name, he was a short thick build man & appeared something like Mr Lloyd. No, it was not Mr Lloyd. There was another man with him, they were both white men. I cant describe them. The man who resembled Mr Lloyd asked me questions about my present home, also my Army service, and said that he was securing names for Mr Lloyd of persons who were in the Army & were not now then applicants or pensioners. Said Mr Lloyd would make my application, and that I would be sent for by Mr Lloyd. I then & there agreed to give my name & service with the understanding that Lloyd was going to apply as my Atty, for a pension for me under the new
