

DEPOSITION BCase of Rosetta Hill, No. 431,809

On this Fourth day of Nov, 1891, at
Baltimore City, County of J
 State of Md, before me, James J. Ely, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared John W.
Hill, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid
 pension claim, deposes and says: I am 33 years of age,

occupation turner, employed
 by H. J. Thompson, Co. Seventeenth St.
B. & O. R. R. I reside at 609 River
St., Baltimore City, which is my
 post office address.

Rosetta Hill - this element is
 my mother. My father's name was
William Hill, he was in Co. C. 19,
U. S. L. Troops, and he died from
 for a wound in his hand. My father
 died at 1875 Fulton Street in this city
 on the 27. June. 1890. The doctor said
 he had an abscess in the hand.

At the time my father died - my
 mother was living with me, at 609
River St. They were not divorced.
 My mother was serving as cook for a
Mrs. Steward, and father when he
 got his pension got running around.
 Mother was taken down with rheumatism
 and had to come to live with me. Father
 and mother kept house, she used to get
 home two or three times in the week; but
 after mother took sick - father broke up
 and went off by himself. He used to
 come to my house two or three times
 a week, up to the time he took with
