he was a child he belonged to the Beck's
the people to whom I belonged and we
lived on the same farm. Then Mr. Beck's

then a Murdoch - below Church Hill - and
I knew him well up until he enlisted.
I became acquainted with Neruitta,
Frisby's wife, when she was a girl
and from then until she was mar-
ried she did not live over 2 miles
from where I lived and I knew her
well.

They were married before the war
but I do not remember how long
before the war it was; it was
several years before the war they
were married.

Neither soldier nor claimant was
married before this marriage to
each other - and they were mar-
ried by a ceremony at the house
