I have stated before as to the nature of his complaints I cannot swear. I never made any such statements at Lloyd's office. I could not do so because I had no knowledge that Frisky was wounded or captured in service, however I now think he did have Rheumatism in service. Not being able to read my own name I cannot identify the papers you show me.

I have now heard read the affidavit of Dec 19, 1892, executed before Geo McCalley, Jr, on W. Balto St. I have no knowledge that I ever made or sworn to any such statement as contained in that affidavit nor read. We were out in an engagement on July 3, 1864. Our first battle was July 30, 1864. I have no personal knowledge that Frisky was ever wounded in service as therein stated and I do not know how I was made to sign such a statement. I have known Frisky ever since the war. I know that he has never been able to do much work since the war because of his disabilities. His complaints of Rheumatism principally. He never told me, to my recollection that he was ever wounded in service. In the best of my recollection this is the first time I ever heard of his being
