I served during the late war in Co. *B*,
39th US Ct. Entered *March 31, 1864* and
was mustered out with my Company *Dec*
1865. I will remember *Benj. Frisby*
of my Company. I first knew him in service.
I remember that *Frisby* was sick and
sitting during pretty much his whole service.
He commenced sitting while we were in front
of Petersburg in 1864 and was sick all the
time after that until we were mustered out
of service. I have no knowledge that *Frisby*
was ever wounded or injured in any way
while in service and while I know he was
sick most of the time. I cannot now state
the nature of his disease or ailments. I
remember that I testified for *Frisby* once but
I don't now recall the nature of that testimony.
I think he testified for me the same day
I did for him. Also *Geo Woodman* was there
as a witness the same day. I remember we
were all there of us there together the same
day, at *Lloyd's* office. I don't know who fixed the
paper I signed nor do I know the major who
swore me. It was a *Squire* in *Lloyd's* office who
