The act of June 27, 1890, requires, in case of a Soldier: An honorable discharge. A minimum service of ninety days. Permanent disability not due to his vicious habits, which need not have originated in the service. The rates under the act are graded from \$6 to \$12, proportioned to the degree of inability to earn a support. The rates are not affected by the rank held. A pensioner under prior laws may apply under this one, or a pensioner under this one may apply under any other laws, but cannot draw more than one pension for the same period.
