These evils, sir, are some of the frequent evils which we daily indeed see, following as the concomitants of this degrading vice...

From whatever cause, from what motive so ever, sir, in the divine mind, so it is that in all his providential arrangements among men, he has intended to prevent the propagation of such a vicious habit...

But let me further ask you, Mr. President, if the steps of humanity can traverse this happy land, this rapidly rising commonwealth, unless you will, sir, without the aid of a powerful structure into disease, disgusting deformity, and pain, laughing at the cries of disconsolate age, the tears of affectionate friends and relatives, heedless, reckless of the widow or the orphan, and their God, and often, as we daily see, of the dearest gift of nature...

It is a sufficient to induce humanity herself powerfully to feel and grievously to lament, to sympathize even with the wretches themselves, guilty of such an outrage against their country, their nature, and their God...
