We there met several gentlemen of the Mission, Messrs. Bingham, Diddle, Johnstone, Chamberlain, and Dr. Judd. Messrs Whit ney, Alexander and Tinker had set off for the Society and Marquesas Islands only a day or two before our arrival. After the ceremonies were over, we proceeded to partake of an entertainment provided by the Consul and the other gentlemen.

On my next visit to the shore, I had a high Ir interesting visit to the Missionaries, and af terwards was accompanied by one of them, to the residence of the chiefs.

was surprised to find so deep a feeling with respect to religion, they expressed them selves in the warmest and strongest terms, and in such a manner as to persuade one that they are real, sincere Christians.

On the sabbath I had the long wished for gratification of witnessing service performed in the native style. Com. Downes and sever al of his officers were present. A sermon was preached by Mr. Bingham; and the strict cet attention was paid to his discourse by the congregation, which probably approached nearly to 3,000. I was charmed with the singing, which was so fine as to produce as unexpected thrill through my frame, and compel me to rise and unite my voice with those of the natives; the tunes being such as had been samiliar with in America. Mr Greer, the chaplain of the Potamac, addressed the assembly, Mr. Bingham acted as interpreter, and I was told that his remarks were very well received.

About fifteen minutes after the close of the service another was held in the English language. In a Sabbath school for native chil dren I found only 60 or 70 scholars, it being the period of vacation among the day schools some of the scholars were absent. An ad dress was made by one of the American visi ters, during which a silence prevailed which would have rendered audible the dropping of a pin. A bible class under the direction of Mr. Chamberlain has between 100 and 200 members, many of whom had very intelligent countenances, and all of whom showed much interest in the lesson. Many pertinent an swers were made to questions which were put to them, and several questions were ask by by them much to the point. Com. Downes. come in, and through Mr. Bingham made very encouraging address to the scholars. the afternoon native service was much like that of the morning. On Wednesday two couples were married, and the cermony was performed with great propriety.
