The court, at the request of Major Gates, was directed to investigate the conduct of that officer during and subsequent to the attack on the military post at Volusia, on the St. John's river in Florida, ambracing the 14th, 15th, 16th of April, of this year.

II. "The court, after mature deliberation on the testimony before them, are of opinion, from the evidence of Adjutant Patterson, Doctor Graham, and Licutenant Pettes, that the 11. the morning when they were killed; such exposure necessarily operating injuriously on the garrisom."

On which proceedings and opinion, Major General Scott, commanding the troops in Florida, made the following remarks:

"It is clear, from the evidence, that the garrison of Fort Barnwell was, at the time it was attacked, at least twice as numerous as the assailing party. A vigorous sortie, with two thirds of the garrison, should, therefore, have been promptly made. The moral effect of such movement would have been great on both sides. Many of the enemy would, probably, have been killed or captured, and the garrison thereby inspired with a just confidence in the superior prowess of the white man."

"If for no other object, a strong detachment ought instantly to have been sent out to bring in the bodies of the sergeant and private who were seen to tall, near the wood, at the beginning of the attack.
