Lambs should always be left at home when sheep are to be washed, as they are saved much accompanying scheme of premiums, as one the first Thursday and Friday of November many accidents incident to the pen, crowded of baving the sheep go directly home without any trouble, after washing. Ticks are very injurious to sheep of all ages, but more so lambs, as they have the trouble of them summer; the ticks leaving the worms for a more secure retreat on the lambs.
