then the spring of 1845.

When I enlisted I was renting a house, and my
wife's brother Leonard Waters lived with us, he
continued to live in the house occupied by my
wife while I was away ^{nearly} up to the time she
went to Somerset Co. Md. Spring of 1845.

When I was mustered out I returned to
Baltimore and sent for my wife, she
joined me about a week after my return.
I then kept house for about one year on Park St
and then went to live in the same house with
Leonard Waters, and lived in the same house
with him for more than (8) years I think.

During the year 1844, saw Leonard Waters two, and
three times each week

Since mustered out I have all the time lived in
Baltimore City. Have moved about a great
deal and cannot state with exactness
where or how long I lived in any one place.

Have suffered with rheumatism continually
since discharge. some times the
disease has affected me worse than others.

Have at no time since discharge been able to do more
half what I could do in 1844, and latterly (for the
past 6 or 7 years) have been able to do very little work

Never was in the military or Naval service of
the U.S. except from about June 1844 to
Dec 1845, while in Co. C. 39. U.S.C. 7. D.
