111 3-8 BUSHELS SHELLED CORN PER ACRE.

Remarkable Success in Growing Large Crops of Maryland Twin Corn-Helpful Advice To Farmers.

In 1910 the Maryland Twin Corn produced with me, 110 bushels of shelled corn per acre. In 1911 the same corn yielded at the rate of 96 bushels per acre. This was done in the face of the most unfavorable conditions of the weather, 1911 being the dryest year ever known in this section. In 1912 this same corn yielded 112 3-8 bushels of shelled corn per acre. In each instance it was actual measurement and not guess work. The above results was without the use of manure or fertilizer. In 1912 I offered two premiums as against one the two years preceding. Therefore the variety of seed corn that will made for that. produce the largest number of bushels to the acre, is what our farmers are interested in. I will now briefly outline a method by which these large crogs of corn can be grown.


Assuming that you have secured the grown acceptable the first essential thing is the preparation of the seed bed. The land should be ploughed very deep, the deeper the better, so you do not turn up too much clay. After the ploughing, you cannot use too much care in getting the earth in perfect order. The condition of the seed bed at this time has much to do with the crop to follow. 1 plant in drills 12 to 15 inches apart, 3.

in rows 3½ feet apart.

One of the very best implements to use before and after the corn comes up. is the weeder. It can be used until the corn is 6 inches in height without injuring the plant. It is a great weed that we have reduced destroyer and at the same time it stimvlates the growth of the corn plant. The corn should be given frequent cultivation while it is growing.
