

With the opening of the oyster season at midnight Sunday there appeared at Long Dock Tuesday 14 bugeyes, skip-lacks and pungies, with the first cargoes ready to supply the market with Maryland's famous product. All of the vessels brought small cargoes, consist-

Some of the vessels which arrived Tuesday morning with the bivalves were the Edna and Alice, Edith M. Dryden, Virginia G. Holland, Urbane, Thomas J, O. P. Roberts, Russell, Kate L. Gerdes, George S. McCready, Violette, Mary E. Foble, M. V. Bennett and Wave. The majority of the vessels carrying the oysters came from the Chester River. All the skippers were sauguine at the prespects for a busy and profitable season.

For the last few years there has been keen competition among the captains of the oyster craft, all anxious to claim the honor of bringing the first load of oysters to the market. This honor last year was won by the bugeye Golden Rule. The laurels went to Captain Chas. H. Ashley, captain of the Edna and Alice. The ougeye carried a cargo of 168 bushels from the Chester River. Captain Ashley, who is one of the! pioneer oystermen trading to this city, stated that, while the growth of the oyster in the Ohester River had somewhat decreased this year, the bivalves were of a fine quality. The laurels for the second vessel arriving fell to the lot of the Sunshine, Captain Linten, from West River, below Annapolis.

The demands were light, with the prices ranging from 50 to 70 cents a bushel Another fleet of vessels, with cargoes tonged from Swan Point, Chester River, Herring Bay and other nearby points arrived Wednesday. These oysters will be taken from the natural bars and beds and will largely determine what the quality and flavor will be this


